



About Morecambe Town Council

Morecambe is a welcoming community, proud of its history, and is currently governed by three tiers of Local Government:

Morecambe Town Council Lancaster City Council Lancashire County Council

Morecambe Town Council was formed in May 2009, following a successful local campaign. Twenty-six seats were created, with each member elected for a term of four years. The town is divided into eleven wards, as you can see below.



Update from Chairman

"As I reflect on the past year, I am incredibly honoured to have been the Chair of Morecambe Town Council.

I would like to thank all councillors, partners and officers for the commitment and support they have given.

The Council has published its three-year Community Action Plan which is now well on its way to being realised. I am also particularly proud to have been involved in the Council's climate emergency declaration this year. I know from many conversations that I've had with business leaders and community groups that their perception of Morecambe Town Council has changed they can see the changes we've made and, more importantly, the impact we are having on the town.

This year we began to organise a series of events with a two-day Dino-Shore-Us event and a Spring into Morecambe artisan market. Our next event is a celebration of Her Majesty's Platinum Jubilee on 2nd June with fireworks, pyrotechnics, entertainment, food stalls, followed by a record-breaking attempt on 5th June to hold the longest street party, with 500 tables spanning 2500ft of Morecambe's promenade. I hope you've booked your table, because they are going fast!

These events are creating a revived sense of civic pride in Morecambe - an opportunity for the community to come together to celebrate our town. But this is only the start, and as our credibility grows, and we gain expertise and experience, I believe we can deliver an even greater level of enhancement and value for our town, our residents, and the local economy.

Welcome Back Fund

The Government's Welcome Back Fund allowed us to put on some fantastic free events for local residents to enjoy, providing some much needed fun after what has been a difficult two years for everyone.

Dino-Shore-Us

Morecambe Town Council delivered its first free event of the year on the 12th and 13th February at the Town Hall, Euston Road, and Regent Park in the West End. The weekend event was sponsored by the Government's Welcome Back Fund and, despite the heavy rain, was a great success, attracting over 3000 people.













Spring into Morecambe

Our Spring into Morecambe event, held on 26th March, was a huge success - we hope you got to enjoy it! There was an Artisan Street Market on Euston Road from 10am to 5pm, as well as live entertainment from the talented one-man-band Captain Cabaret and Northern Heights Aerial Stilt Walkers. The market showcased lots of the wonderful food, drinks and gifts created by local businesses.

Later in the evening, more than 10,000 people gathered on Morecambe promenade to watch the spectacular firework and light show. With local DJ Gaz Shepherd hosting, there was a fantastic party atmosphere. The event provided a great boost to the local economy, with many people visiting local cafes, bars and restaurants throughout the day.

Climate emergency



This year, Morecambe Town Council declared a climate emergency and recognised the effects of global warming, resolving to tackle the climate emergency by:

- 1) Forming a working group involving councillors, residents, business owners, and experts from local education institutions to establish a plan to identify how Morecambe can be net-zero carbon by 2030.
- 2) Introducing climate change impact assessments, including carbon emission appraisals to all council activities.

Why do we need to take action?

Carbon emissions have a damaging impact on the planet, causing global warming, leading to climate change.

The increase in severe weather events around the world? Climate change.

Rising sea levels? Climate change.

Melting of the polar ice caps? Climate change.

We are already seeing the devastating effect climate change is having on the habitats of animals around the world, as well as the harrowing impact severe weather events have had on communities in many countries. If we don't act now, it will only get worse, and we will start to see more extreme weather events, like flooding, in Morecambe.



What can I do?

Small steps can make a big difference when taken collectively, and there are lots of small steps you can take to reduce your carbon footprint and take care of both Morecambe and the planet as a whole. A lot of these steps will not only help the planet, but they'll save you money too. Win-win.

- Walk or cycle shorter journeys if/when possible.
- For longer journeys, look into using public transport, or car sharing.
- Buying locally made/sourced products reduces your carbon footprint, and it supports the local economy too.
- Take care of your clothes and buy second hand where possible.
- Turning your heating down by as little as 1°C can make a difference.
- Turn appliances off at the wall when you're not using them.

Climate emergency



Walk2Cop26 Climate Crisis Conference

Morecambe Town Council attended the Walk2Cop26 Climate Crisis Conference on Friday 22nd October at Morecambe Winter Gardens. We welcomed a group walking all the way from London to the COP 26 conference in Glasgow.

The event encouraged those attending to look hard at what climate change means to them and what can be done to tackle carbon emissions. The conference was free to attend and was open to all businesses, individuals, and community groups to take a collaborative approach to help tackle the climate emergency and look at what we can do, both individually and together.

Speakers and panellists included Sam Baker, organiser of WalktoCop26; Lancaster City Council Leader, Caroline Jackson; Millie Prosser, founding member of LYFE (Lancaster Youth For The Environment), a social movement which unites and empowers young people to engage in environmental and political issues locally; Tom Narey from Eden Project North; and Daniel Dixon, Performance Improvement Manager of Heysham 1 Power Station from EDF, which supported the event.



Cleaning up Morecambe

Our Public Realm Operatives have been busy clearing Morecambe of litter and weeding public spaces to help keep Morecambe beautiful. We've also held litter picking days, inviting locals along to get involved, so we can all work together to make Morecambe a litter-free zone. Councillor Surgeries

Each month we hold a Councillor Surgery in a different ward with one or more councillors from that ward. These are held in public places and you don't need to let us know you're coming - simply turn up and speak to your councillor about any ideas or concerns you might have. You will find details of these surgeries in our monthly newsletters, on our website and on social media.

How you can take part in the democratic process

As we've said, the Council is here to serve you, so it only makes sense that you have a say in who represents you. Local elections take place every four years, and as long as you're registered to vote, you can vote for the local councillor of your choice for your ward. Sometimes councillor vacancies occur in between. When this happens, the Proper Officer will announce the vacancy, and the residents of that ward have 14 days to gather 10 signatures and addresses (from people in that ward only) to call for a by-election. If this doesn't happen, it goes to a co-option, where other members of the council vote the new councillor in.

Looking forward

Eden Project North

It's official, Eden Project is coming to Morecambe! The plans were approved earlier this year, with the aim for the project to be completed in 2024. This is very exciting for Morecambe, as it will boost tourism, the local economy, and will create a lot of job opportunities for locals. And, of course, the advantage of having such a unique experience to enjoy on our own doorstep. We're sure you're as excited as we are!



Frontierland site

Following a purchase by Lancaster City Council, Morecambe Town Council has set up a steering group to liaise with the local community and key stakeholders to research the opportunities available for the former Frontierland site so we can make good use of the land to positively serve the community. 
